Introduction

Workshop 1: How to strengthen provision in education for refugee learners

In this workshop The Bell Foundation and Refugee Education UK (REUK), will share initial findings from a mixed methods research study examining what is happening across the UK with regards to education provision for young people who arrive late in the education system, at the upper-secondary or college level (from year 9 onwards). The session will explore practical ideas for supporting refugee learners and consider how Further Education settings can create spaces in which refugee learners feel safe, feel they belong, and can succeed academically and beyond. Participants will have the opportunity to work in small groups in which they can reflect on their existing provision for refugee learners and share ideas for strengthening this provision.

Workshop 2: Literacy and homelessness: A roadmap for support

An estimated 50% of adults with experience of homelessness have inadequate literacy for their daily needs. They have constant struggles with public transport, medical appointments and inclusion in the digital world. Crucially, it affects their ability to read official documents, fill in forms and find suitable employment. For individuals with multiple and complex needs, opportunities to improve their skills can seem out of reach. Low self-esteem and overwhelmingly negative memories of childhood schooling are barriers to re-engagement with education.

Literacy100's report, 'Empowerment Through Literacy: A Charter for Adults with Experience of Homelessness', explores ways in which educational provision can be made more accessible to vulnerable adults. Its Charter calls for professionals, organisations and policy-makers to endorse and adopt its recommendations. This seminar will provide an overview of the report, and will be an opportunity to hear directly from adults who have been affected by both low literacy and homelessness.

Workshop 3: Functional Skills Maths: The ESOL Success Story

Low numeracy skills foster an environment in which people feel 'left behind' leading to a loss of equality and social exclusion as it hinders the ability to integrate, find work and participate in community life. Maths has its own language, even more challenging for ESOL learners. It creates an inequality of opportunity when compared to native speakers of English learning maths.

At South Bank Colleges, a pilot project to teach FS Maths was devised with a detailed curriculum plan supporting delivery with a critical element; Support ESOL tutors to teach FS maths. We communicated the 'why' to the team and demonstrated the impact on the lives of ESOL learners. A process to change mind-sets began. By year end, 504 learners had enrolled, above 85% achieved at least 1 FS maths qualification ranging from E1 to L1 FS maths. Technologies to Teach and Support Adult Skills Learners: Findings from Research and Future

This session explores findings from research on using digital technologies to teach and support adult skills learners and new directions for research to understand how these technologies can be used effectively with adult skills learners. The session will provide a framework for examining the phases of knowledge development about the use of digital technologies and will discuss findings from studies of practices to prepare users of technologies, to implement technologies, and to assess outcomes from the use of technologies.
